DR. LOUISA SHOBHINI PONNAMPALAM: MARINE MAMMAL MALADY

DWINDLING DUGONGS

"There are at least 27 species of marine mammals found in Malaysian waters – 26 of these are whales, dolphins or porpoises, and one species of dugong. Contrary to popular belief, most of the species most commonly found in Malaysia are from localised populations, i.e. they did not migrate from somewhere else to our waters, nor are they strays. The issues facing our marine mammals include entanglement in fishing gear, habitat degradation, decline in prey resources (due to intense fishing activities), diseases as a result of a compromised environment, and lack of protection for their core habitats. Our dugong populations are likely to be rather small and in Johor, our surveys calculate that there are only 0.04 dugongs for every km of sea searched with an average of 15 dugongs sighted in a day (a low number). Our leatherback turtles

are now functionally extinct i.e., there may still be some individuals in the wild, but they will not be able to reproduce to ensure the survival of the population – in our case, this is due to a highly skewed sex ratio (more females than males due to error in incubating the eggs – higher temperatures mean that more females are formed)."

S.O.S (SAVE OUR SEAFOOD)

"Things aren't looking good.
Our fisheries have all crashed,
yet we remain the top consumers
of seafood in Southeast Asia.
Seagrass meadows, which are
incredibly biodiverse and have
many ecological functions, are
not afforded any legal provisions
in Malaysia, save for areas where
they happen to fall within marine
parks. Also, seagrass meadows are
threatened with permanent removal
due to coastal development and
land reclamation."
